Our Mother's Day went smoothly; our children took time to prepare a little gift to give to their mom, grandma, auntie or to anyone who is a mother figure to them. It

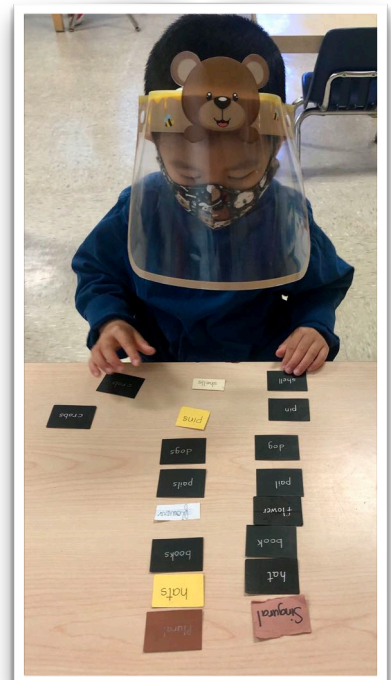
was such a meaningful and yet simple gift that was easy to assemble; even the youngest child in my class (two years and seven months old) enjoyed doing it! The

Now about classroom progress. The older children are polishing their reading skills by reading more phonogram words and learning some functions of words.

Phonograms are two or three letter combinations that represent a vocal sound; for example "oy" that says "oi" as in boy. These words can later be written in cursive and the children also love to spell them out using the movable alphabet. There are 70 basic phonograms.

Short and long chains are practiced as skip counting of numbers and are very useful in multiplication. The children focus their learning process in the language and



math areas. They still have this coming school year to master and learn all that is needed to strengthen their reading skills. Before they graduate next year they will be able to read and write, make a journal notebook or a story, and be more a confident and independent child. The younger children are moving into counting and writing more numbers in sequence. They are almost done with their phonic sounds and are starting to write their name! They love their rug works and modeling after the older children. In this way they are learning to be industrious and courteous.

Again, I would like to say thank you to Ms. Martinez, Ms. Mills, and Ms. Ramirez for all your support, discipline, and follow-up with the children. Thank you also for the art works you give to the children and the little treats generously given for special events in school. All these are enjoyed by the children and create memories they will never forget from their early years of learning at Meher. Ladies, your continuous dedication, patience, love and compassion to these children is priceless and inspiring. Keep up the good work; I am blessed to work with you all!

A Report From Mr. Mindes

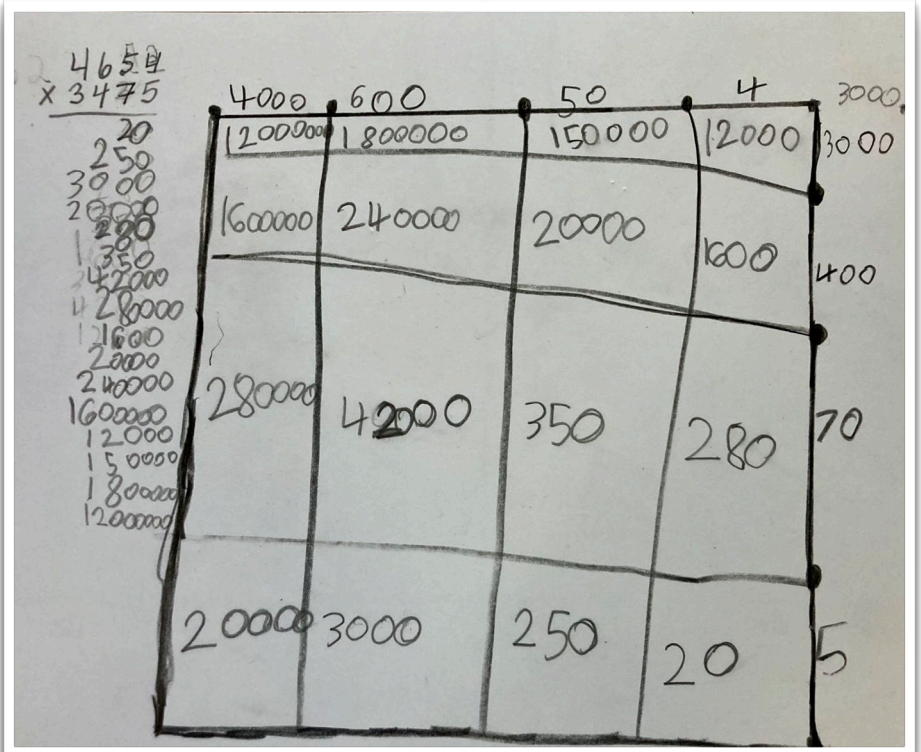
The above quote, attributed to Dr. Montessori, is the goal (in my eyes) of a Montessori education. We believe our school's small group lessons, instruction adapted to different developmental states, freedom to choose work (guided by responsibility), and our larger classroom interaction support the initiative needed to be "equipped for the adventure of life." As the end of the school year is close upon us, we hope that those students moving on,

whether to the next year at Meher, middle school or any other place, are equipped with imagination, enthusiasm, confidence, and initiative!

Upper and Lower Elementary Class notes

Even though I know it was going to happen, it still amazes me and brings a celebratory feeling when I see a student, seemingly struggling with reading, suddenly and confidently start to read! It's as if just a few months earlier, they didn't see reading as a painful chore! Of course, too, there were the already proficient readers that were challenged to read more advanced texts and identify the central theme.

Also, in mathematics, multi-digit multiplication problems, say a problem like 4654×3475 , became doable and requested! Similarly, skills such as long division, fractions with different denominators, the place-value system (for the younger), or working with exponents, percents, area, and volume (for the older) appeared to just click. As a teacher, even though we may forget it during the year, new ideas learned by our students, or anyone

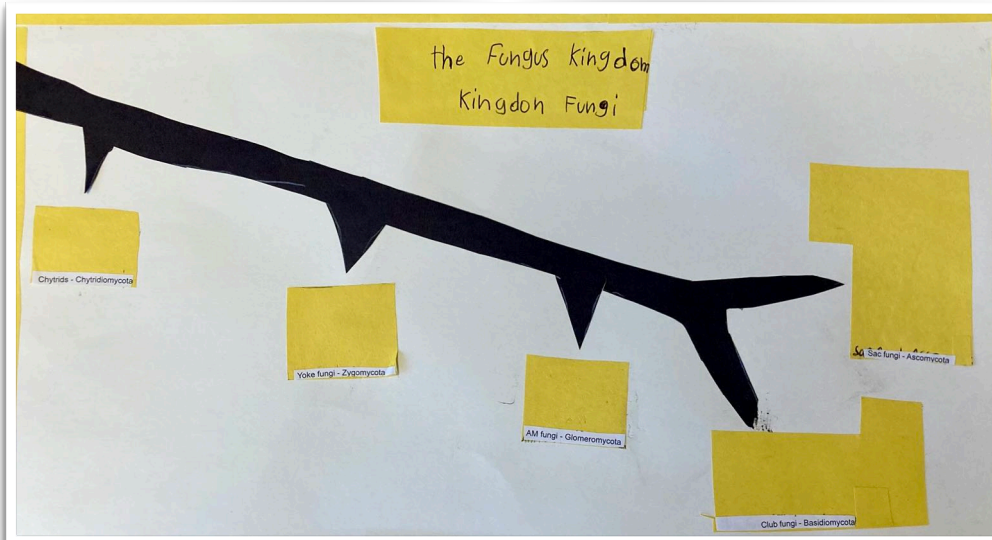


else for that matter, just need time to simmer, ferment, before sprouting.

In our study of life sciences, specifically taxonomy, we have finally reached a kingdom of organisms that the students can see! Who hasn't seen a mushroom sprout in some damp wet place; or picked up an orange to find its peel sporting a greenish white mold; or that piece of bread, with its corner stained with some funky color scheme ... Welcome to Kingdom Fungi.

Finally, as the older students have

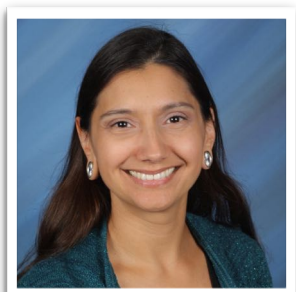
worked fairly regularly on summary writing and sentence construction, I recently asked them to write paragraphs. Brandon, a history buff leaving us for middle school next year, chose to write on the Freedom Riders - civil rights activists from the 1960's. Below is part of his paragraph:



“On May 14, 1961, a bus arriving at the Anniston, Alabama Greyhound Bus station was met by a mob of 50 Klu Klux Klan members, southern segregationists. They slashed the bus’s tires, broke its windows ... Later, they would fire bomb the bus ... forcing riders to escape out through the windows ... The bus riders, members of the Congress of Racial Equality (CORE) were testing a 1947 Supreme Court ruling that segregation on interstate bus travel was unconstitutional”

Mrs. Wildhaber's Classroom

Picture this: A brand new two-year-old, standing in front of the drawing activity saying "help" because she is just not quite tall enough to reach the paper to put it on the tray. She is not asking anyone for help specifically, she is just saying it repeatedly out into the ether, waiting for a nearby older child to come to her. Which happens every time.

Now, fast forward to just three months later. The same two-year-old heads to the shelf with the drawing activity, only this time she does not say help. She takes the tray with the crayons off the shelf and sets it on the floor. Then, still not quite tall enough, she realizes that if she steps to the side of the shelf, she can reach the drawing paper



that way, and she proceeds to do so. Then as she is about to place the paper on the tray that is still on the floor, she realizes she has grabbed two papers by mistake. After spending a few minutes properly separating the papers, she puts one on the tray and walks back to the side of the shelf to replace the extra paper. She then picks up the tray off the floor and proceeds to her table to begin creating art. This is what Montessori does for children. Community assistance when needed while also fostering growth, independence, confidence in one's abilities, determination, and perseverance.

I have another example of Montessori in action in the classroom. A child pointed out to me that one of the buttons in our beautiful new buttoning frame had come loose. I set the dressing frame aside until I could procure the red thread necessary to keep it uniform in color. Once I had the thread ready, I asked one of the children who has become skilled at sewing a four-hole button in our sewing activity, if they would like to fix the dressing frame for us. The child was so excited to be asked to do this. There was so much pride on their face as I helped them set everything up. Being able to use their skill from our little activity of sewing a button onto a scrap of fabric, and apply it practically was a huge accomplishment for the child.

On May 5th, Miss Tinajero brought mini conchas (Mexican sweet bread) for our

class. As I explained to the class that Cinco de Mayo is to honor a battle won between Mexico and French invaders, I was so proud of the way the class was able to break it down and restate the story in their own words: the French were trying to steal from the Mexicans and they wouldn't let them. And, as many of the kiddos are working on a variety of puzzle maps, some were really surprised that the French traveled so far to try to take something.

Another celebration in May is Eid al Fitr, which is the Muslim celebration of breaking the fast after Ramadan. While there are many differences in all cultural celebrations, once again the children continued to impress with their ability to find connections across multiple ways of life and belief systems. Through a guided discussion, they were able to connect new clothing with Lunar New Year, presents with Christmas and Hanukkah, and eating special food and praying with Hanukkah.

During lunch, I have begun incorporating music from other cultures for the kiddos to enjoy. These are mostly instrumental compilations. I do not want to inadvertently expose them to language or lyrics too mature for them. Any recommendations from the Amazon music library, to continue to broaden the musical exposure for the kiddos, is greatly appreciated. Right now we have Latin guitar, music from the east,

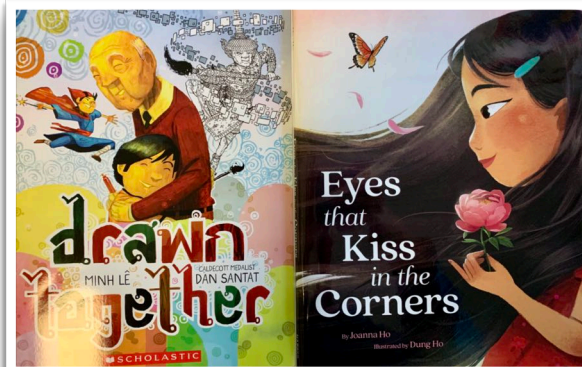
relaxing Celtic music, and Japanese instrumental music worked into our rotation.

Speaking of Japanese music, May was also AAPI (Asian American and Pacific Islander) month. I would like to thank Austin, from Miss Tinajero's classroom, for bringing awareness to the kiddos by gifting them all goody bags filled with snacks they may, or may not, have previously been exposed to.

As I am always looking for ways to incorporate diversity into the classroom, I was so happy that I was able to procure two new books to honor AAPI Month. *Drawn Together* and *Eyes that Kiss in the Corner* are two beautiful books that speak of the generational cultural divide some

Asian-Americans experience with the older generation. It also tells of how the children in the story bridge the gap. Some of the girls in my classroom were particularly engaged in *Eyes that Kiss in the Corners* as they saw themselves in the illustrations.

As the school year comes to an end, I would like to say how proud I am of this year's graduates. After completing the three-year Meher Montessori program, they are ready to move on to the next chapter in their lives. Not only do they have a strong foundation in reading, writing, and math, but they also have a strong foundation in what will make them good citizens of the world. They are curious, generous, funny, kind,



helpful, engaging, the list goes on.

Any teacher would gladly welcome these kiddos into the first-grade classroom in a good year. In a year where teachers are going to have to spend more time than usual trying to normalize their classroom after a year filled with distance and hybrid learning, the graduates are likely going to shine in their first-grade classrooms. Accustomed to full-day in-person learning, I have no doubt they will continue to be leaders in the classroom, and a big help to their new teachers.

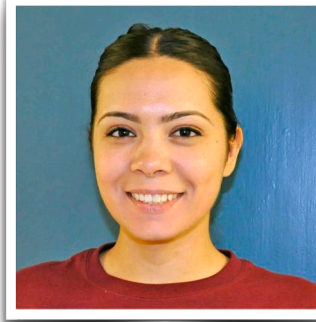

The children and I have been talking about grace and courtesy a great deal. Grace and courtesy lessons are very important to introduce to the children at this age because these lessons teach the children

what it means to be polite and how to appropriately communicate their feelings. A few examples of grace and courtesy are: walking in the classroom, using the materials properly, using kind words to express how you feel to someone else, greeting someone, and pushing in your chair. Over the month during group time I modeled a few lessons on grace and courtesy, one in which has become very important since the weather in Altadena is so random. I showed the children how to properly hang up and take off their jackets from the coat rack. We have also discussed how to politely ask children to move aside when some one is in their way. Another very important grace and courtesy lesson that we



also modeled was how to solve a conflict when someone is being unkind.

Care of our environment-

When the children come into this environment they are taught the basic ways to



care for themselves and the environment. For example, when spills occur, this becomes an impromptu moment for me to give the child a lesson on how to clean up a spill. Many times when the children are eating during lunch time they spill or drop food on their floor. These are some moments where we take the opportunity to give a lesson on how to use the dust pan or crumb tray. These lessons help the child become independent in the environment. We provide the children with tools and cleaning materials so when accidents occur they can take care of it themselves.

The children also care for our outdoor environment. They help Mrs. Maggie sweep the wood chips back onto the playground, and they help water our garden. We are currently proudly growing tomatoes, corn, potatoes, strawberries, and pumpkins. Caring for the environment helps the children appreciate it while also facilitating independence and refining their large and fine motor skills.

We did it! What a year it's been! I want to start by thanking all the families and students in the classroom. I am so incredibly thankful for each and every one of you, each child has brought their unique personality and has challenged me in the classroom. I see challenge as growth and I always make a point to tell the children that when we are challenged and find a way to overcome the challenge, we grow. I want to thank the children for always being kind and being so wonderful this whole year. When the school year started the children came into a classroom different from before the pandemic. They were so resilient and adapted wonderfully to the new rules and regulations that were brought upon us as necessary. Thank you all so much. Till next year...

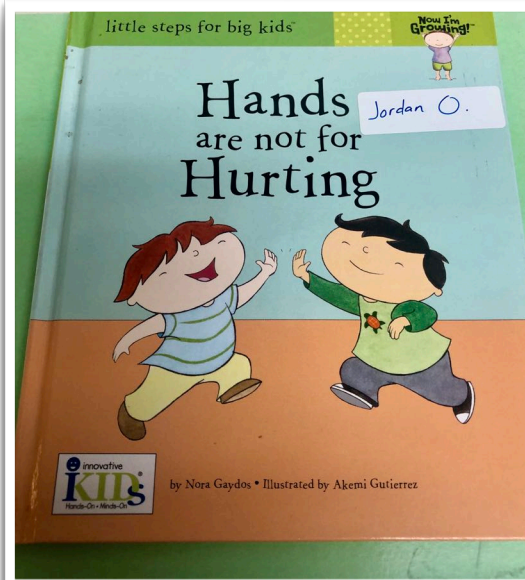


Fundraising Report From Fundraising Co-chairs

Nathan was also part of Habitat for Humanity, Spanish Honors Society, and Sports Medicine Club.

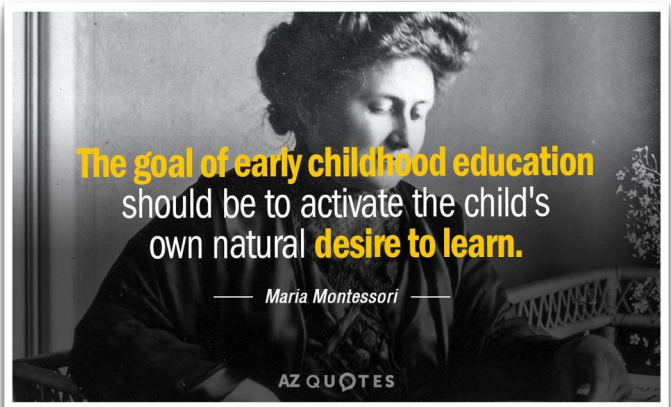
Nathan will be starting Loyola Marymount University in the Fall. He was accepted to their Health & Human Sciences division and will be focusing on a major in medicine.
